PI Foundation in collaboration with GVK-EMRI is implementing Swasthya Seva through 3 Mobile Medical Vans that supports more than one lakh population from remote 64 villages of Jambusar.

Our Swasthya Seva ensured access to quality healthcare and impacted over One lakh people residing in remote location of Jambusar taluka. This has reduced financial burden on health expenditure for the poor families.

PI Foundation is utilising these Mobile Medical Units 24x7 in 64 villages of Jambusar, Gujarat for spreading awareness on the necessity of social distancing, hand-sanitization through instruction leaflets. The services are extended for conducting thermal screening, distributing masks and other necessities to villagers.

Ensuring Environmental and Health Consciousness through Responsible Management of used Plastic Containers

Today's farmers lack awareness on how to dispose of agri-packaging like fertilizer sacks, agrochemical cans, plastic containers etc. and the effects of resorting to harmful practices like burning. To facilitate the safe disposal and responsible management of these plastic containers, PI along with Bayer and UPL initiated the 'plastic take-back programme' to provide channels to responsibly dispose the agri-container plastic waste from farmers and send them for recycling.

A process has been defined for collection, segregation and disposal. The project will be implemented by Recykal who shall be providing the solutions (both digital and physical) to ensure safe disposal.

The project was launched both physically and virtually in Sahayadri farms, Nashik, Maharashtra last month. Continuous efforts for collecting and segregating the refused containers is happening at the project site. Going forward, this unique program will contribute to our society, keep the pollution-free environment, the upcoming generation safe, and make sure farmer brothers are getting the most out of this program through our support. Following activities in terms of cage installation were done during the month.

Sustainable Rice Production with the Conservation of Natural Resources through Direct Seeded Rice in Multiple States of India

PI Foundation has been working closely with farmers in the agriculturally backward region of the country to promote a farming system that is more sustainable—environmentally, economically, and socially. In association with State Agricultural Universities and NGO's, our field team propagates the benefits of Direct Seeded Rice (DSR) technique through various awareness camps, farmers meetings, setting up demonstration farms with farmers and trainings across multiple rice growing states in the country.

During the month, Harvesting was done in most of the locations. When we compared the output of DSR method with the traditional method, we found that DSR resulted in net profit of ₹3,000 - ₹4,000 per acre more than the traditional method.



Various points discussed in these meetings included:

- Sharing advantages associated with DSR including water conservation, labour management, energy and cost savings
- Yield benefits of DSR Technique
- Timely management of disease and pests in DSR and reduced cost of cultivation

Transforming Rural Livelihood through Farmers Field School

PI Foundation is working closely with small holders' tribal farmers in the agriculturally backward region of Jharkhand. The project was envisaged to enhance the productivity of the farming land through training of farmers. Progressive farmers were identified and five demonstration plots were set up as Farmers Field School (FFS) in the project locations. The centres serve as the learning centre for local farmers.



During the month of February training of target farmers was conducted by having interactive sessions and group activities. Exposure visits for the learning farmers was conducted on the demo fields. Facilitators were instrumental in upgrading the knowledge of the farmers through field days and training programmes. Details of 5 demonstration sites along-with the farmers undergoing training in the districts of East Singhbhum location-wise is given below:

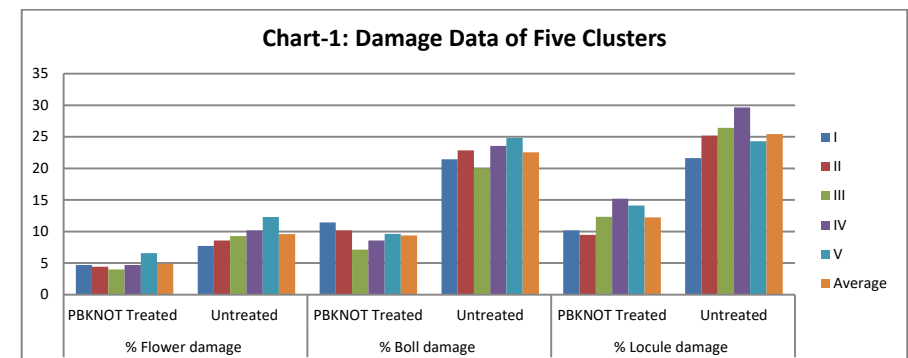
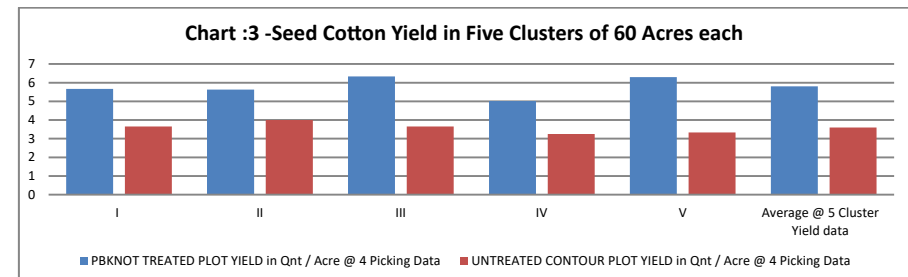
Reviving Cotton Production and Increasing Growers' Income in India through Eco-friendly PB Knot Technology



PI Foundation in collaboration with The South Asia Biotechnology Centre (SABC) & Roots Foundation has been implementing an innovative and multi-stakeholder 'PROJECT BANDHAN: A Knot of PBW Protection' to embrace cutting-edge innovation by tagging the environmental friendly PB Knot technology to protect the cotton plant from devastating PBW (Pectinophora gossypiella).

Pink Bollworm (PBW) is one of the major pests of cotton in India. Its infestation is a big menace to cotton cultivation in cotton growing regions of the country. Cotton growers from across the country have to incur huge yield loss due to PBW infestation. 'Project Bandhan' is an exemplary initiative to promote pheromone based IPM production system of cotton. The project involves adopting villages to showcase IPM Package of practices and implement mating disruption technology on a mass scale to control Pink Bollworm (PBW).

As part of the CSR initiative, PI Foundation is supporting the area-wide implementation of Project Bandhan and is committed to sustainable agriculture and environmental protection. Selection of plots has been done and implementation is in full swing under the supervision of MDO.





ASMITA Project - Women Empowerment through Improved Access to Credit and Livelihood Initiatives in 20 Villages

ASMITA project is being implemented with an aim to form and strengthen self-help groups of women for creating a sustainable base for micro finance activity in 20 villages- 15 villages of Jambusar (Sarod, Nodhna, Uber, Vedach, Samoj, Kavali, Nahar, Kangam, Amanpur, Tundaj, Kareli, Kanhva, Piludra, Nobar & Bhodar) and 5 villages of Panoli area (Panoli, Sanjali, Kapodara, Bakrol & Umarwada).

CORONA virus pandemic created an opportunity to test the resilience of the leadership and systems. Second & third wave has forced to adapt the new normal strigently. Following interventions were done during the month in Jambusar.

- **Strengthening of SHGs:** Monthly meetings of 126 groups were conducted and 1135 SHG members participated in the meeting. 20 new women joined Self Help Group during the month. The meetings entailed discussions on regularity of conducting meetings, savings, loan repayments, updating records and linking members with Insurance & Govt. schemes. The women were made aware on vaccination drive

- 3 preliminary meeting conducted in Amanpur, Kareli and Piludara village participated by 25 women
- **Status of Savings:** 126 groups accumulated total savings of ₹2.44 lac
- **Status of Loan Accessed:** 15 women from 5 villages accessed loans amounting to ₹3,34,000. This month's loan was majorly availed for Animal Husbandry. 10 SHG women renewed their Joint Liability Group Loan of ₹3,00,000





- **Credit Awareness Camp**

5 Credit Awareness Camps were organized in Kareli, Piludara & Bhodar villages. 59 Self Help Group members from 9 Self Help Groups participated in these camps. Discussion held on paying regular savings and credit installments. Information regarding government schemes and insurance policies discussed and disseminated

- **Leveraging Govt Schemes**

- 10 women joined Pradhan Mantri Jeevan Jyoti Bima Yojana
- 5 women joined Pradhan Mantri Suraksha Bima Yojana
- 13 women linked with Aatma project

- **Highlights of Panoli**

Monthly meetings of 94 groups were conducted covering 1114 SHG members. The meetings entailed discussions on regularity of conducting meetings, savings, loan repayments and linking members with insurance schemes. The women were made aware on vaccination drive and enrolment

Groups who received loans through Mahila Utkarsh Yojna were duly informed about repayment of the loan amount by depositing ₹1,000 per month. All groups who have opened their bank accounts, were advised to submit necessary documents to submit in Taluka for receiving the revolving fund

- **Status of Savings & Loan**

- 79 groups collected a total saving of ₹1,05,800
- A total loan amount of ₹71,000 was availed by 11 women. Majorly loan was availed for initiating income generating activity, education & health





- **VO Training**

Taluka incharge of JLG (Joint Liability Group) imparted information on formation of VO to our SHG members in Kapodra Village. All the SHG group leaders were present. VO (Village Organisation) is formed through a collective of 10 SHGs and each SHG contains 10 members. One member from each SHG forms a part of Sakhi Group and a President, Minister and Treasurer are elected from this group to manage VO's accounts. The VO gets a loan of ₹7,00,000



- **Grading**

Women from 10 groups participated for grading audit. Of the 10 groups 7 groups received 'A' grade, 3 groups received 'B' grade. Groups from 2 villages underwent the grading process where the groups' characteristics in account keeping, money transaction, individual and bank passbooks were evaluated

- **Leveraging Govt. Schemes**

58 SHG members were linked with schemes. Forms were filled for Ayushman Card, e-Shram Card, and Widow Pension and submitted to the Government office. Information about 'Pradhan Mantri Suraksha Bima' and 'Pradhan Mantri Jivan Jyoti Bima' was shared with members

- e-Shram Card
- Ayushman Card
- Widow Pension Card

- **Household and Community Waste Management**

A session was conducted on models of community-based waste management with members of Aman Swa Sahay Juth and Ganga Swa Sahay Juth in Panoli. A pit was dug in their community area for 30 households for waste collection, so that people do not throw their waste at other places but collect it in one place and make compost out of it. The progress is closely monitored by weekly visits by project person



Economic Empowerment of Women Smallholders and Workers through Improved Agriculture and Inclusive Dairy Value Chain Promotion

PI Foundation along with CARE India is implementing a project titled 'Improved Agriculture and Inclusive Dairy Value Chain Promotion' (IAIDVC-II) in 59 villages of Jambusar block of Bharuch district in Gujarat. The project is working with 3,369 women smallholders through 293 Self Help Groups (SHGs) and 6 cluster level federations. The goal of the project is to enhance economic empowerment of women smallholders and landless workers through improved agriculture, livestock, and inclusive dairy value chain promotion.

Strengthening of SHGS and Federation

- **SHG Meetings:** Field team participated in monthly savings meetings of 193 SHGs to observe the SHGs functions. Team has ensured the discussion on importance of internal loaning and regular repayment of the loan, federation structure and vision during the saving meetings. Also, the entrepreneurs (Sangini, Beautician, Pashu Sakhi, Tailor, Jewelry Making etc.) promote their products and services in the savings meetings

- **Federations:** Monthly meeting of all 6 federations is being organized every month in different villages in which two to three representatives from all Federations participate. This meeting is used to exchange updates and ideas along with marketing and promotion of products and services of the Federation. The 11th monthly meeting of the Federation was organized at village Dabha in which 42 members participated





- **Savings and Loan:** ₹2.69 lac was the monthly saving of 273 SHGs cumulatively total saving of 293 SHGs till date is ₹1,08,83,462. ₹2,94,500 has been accessed by 33 SHG members through internal loan. The purpose of taking loan was mainly to purchase agriculture input material, cattle feed, goat purchase, starting small petty shop and medical help etc
- **Bank linkages:** Bank account of three SHGs opened with Baroda Gujarat Gramin Bank Jambusar. One SHG received Cash Credit Limit of ₹1,00,000 while another SHG received ₹1,00,000 loan under Mukhya Mantri Mahila Utkarsh Yojana. The latter repaid the loan of Mukhya Mantri Mahila Utkarsh Yojana regularly and was asked by the bank to apply for renewal of the loan. Regular follow up done by SHG members with the bank for the submitted applications of Cash Credit Limit and MMUY loan
- **Exposure Visit:** 32 members of 3 Federations visited KMV Federation, Mandavi to witness cluster meeting and its operations, interact with the Federation members to observe and learn from their experience

Milk Collection Centre - Centre of Excellence

- Monthly meeting of Milk Collection Centres (MCC) of excellence was organized in which 12 MCC members participated. Government official of Jambusar Taluka approached Bojadra Milk Collection Centre for disseminating the information on the government scheme

Capacity Building Trainings

SHG assessment is being done every six months using the Collective Capacity Assessment Tool (CCAT) tool and, based on analysis, the training need of SHGs identified. In this month financial literacy, leadership and management training and vision building exercise were conducted with SHG members to build their capacity. Apart from this, trainings for Agri leaders and Business Development Plan training for entrepreneurs were organized in this month

- In this month advance level financial literacy training on digital banking and importance of regular repayment of loan was conducted with 128 SHG members. 52 SHG leaders have been trained on leadership and management to enhance their skills



- Flip charts were developed to create critical awareness on the federation among all SHG members. In this month 25 trainings have been organized on vision building with 188 SHG members using the flip chart
- TOT for cluster coordinators and change agents have been organized on disease and insect management of wheat crop and kitchen garden
- 144 Agri leaders have been given training by cluster coordinators and change agents on the topics covered in TOT
- 20 Gender Dialogues have been facilitated with 198 couples using the gender dialogue toolkit

Income Generation Activities for Landless Women

- 10 landless members who were trained in the trade of Khatli work applied for the artisan card facilitated by team members
- 16 Bakri Palak Pathshala have been organized to create awareness on ideal & scientific practices of goat rearing and to promote Pashu Sakhi work
- 5 De-worming camps have been organized in different villages by Pashu Sakhi in which around 100 goats were given De-worming doses





Linkages Strengthened

14 SHGs grading has been done by NRLM department, facilitated by project team for the process of revolving fund, out of them 6 SHGs received revolving fund of ₹60,000 (₹10,000 per SHG).

Project developed and strengthened the linkages with Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK). KVK has supported 40 women farmers with pigeon pea seeds and 20 women farmers with wheat seeds. In this month Scientist from KVK visited the demonstration plots of wheat, pigeon pea and Napier.

Farmers Field Business School (FFBS) on Improved Agricultural Package of Practices- Irrigation and Jivamrut

In this rabi season, project has established 20 wheat demonstration plots with the support of Krishi Vigyan Kendra. To promote improved package of practices through demonstration plots, Project team organized FFBS on every stage of crop cycle. In this month FFBS sessions have been organized on rain irrigation on wheat demonstration plots in which 22 female farmers and 8 male farmers participated. Introduced Rain irrigation system (type of micro-irrigation) at wheat demonstration plot that can save water

and nutrients. Farmers get to know about how to increase farm yield using Micro-Irrigation and bettering the quantity & quality of the produces simultaneously maintaining the quality of the agricultural land especially in water scarce as well as saline water area like Jambusar Region.





Employability-linked Skill Development Centre at Jambusar

PI Foundation along with Rural Shores has been running Skill Development Centre in Jambusar. At the centre, unemployed and underprivileged youth are trained with vocational training courses across various sectors to generate employment after the course completion. New trade as 'electrician' has been introduced this year and has replaced 'food & beverage service stewards' basis the post-covid assessment of potential employment opportunities in nearby areas. The courses are for 3 months (Min 500 Hrs per trainee) with an annual intake of 400 students.

3rd Valedictory program was organized at PI Foundation Skill Development Centre, Jambusar. Shri Pradeep Kumar Jain, President Operations, PI Industries Limited, Shri Nilesh Bhavsar, Renowned Social Activist, Jambusar, Sarpanch, Karmad, along with representatives from PI Foundation graced the occasion and handed over Certificate of Completion to 108 successful students. Students got placement letters for job in the range of ₹7500 - ₹10,500 salary.

PI Foundation Skill Development Centre has been running after ease of COVID-19 second wave with strict adherence to protocol. Total 480 students enrolled in 2021-22. 355 students successfully completed their courses and 202 got placement. Currently batch is running with 125 students, 37 enrolled for trade 'electrician', 44 for 'BPO executive, 44 in 'Advance Excel'.





Improving Learning Outcomes in 135 Govt. Elementary Schools of Jambusar

PI Foundation in collaboration with Pratham Education Foundation has been implementing a CSR project to improve learning outcomes of over 12,000 children enrolled in Govt. Elementary Schools located in 82 Villages of Jambusar Block. The project envisages age & grade appropriate learning standards for students in 135 Schools of Jambusar taluka in Bharuch district.



Highlights during the month

- Total **5545** children (from grade I-VIII) participated in regular activities
- 40 days Learning camp is going on in 24 schools: 10 days 3rd learning camp completed in 14 schools. 10 days 2nd learning camp completed in 9 schools. 10 days 1st Learning camp completed in 1 schools. 727 children from standard 3 to 5 are participating in these camps
- Children are working and learning in groups with the help of various TLM
- Light activities running with total 1188 children from Std 1 & 2 under 24 schools
- Science Workshop completed in schools & community in all villages
- Library Groups are running in all villages
- Daily Home activities through message sharing is going on in all villages



Science Workshop:

- Astronomy workshop completed in 41 schools of 38 villages by Vigyan Mitra. Total 841 children's covered from Std 7 under this Science workshop. 35 Astronomy Workshops completed at the community level. Total 880 children covered from std 6 to 8 in this workshop

Library Group Activities:
